#### Lost property

#### **Uniform expectations**

Langley Grammar School has a formal uniform policy and all students from Year 7 to the Sixth Form are expected to conform to it.

Some minor changes to the uniform policy were made during the summer and the current policy can be found on the school website in the **Policies** section under the **Parents** menu. There are different requirements for students in Years 7-11 and in the Sixth Form, where a more appropriate dress code operates. Please make sure you are familiar with the policy as it applies to your son or daughter.

There are a number of areas where we often have to remind students of our expectations; the most common of these are:

*Girls' skirts* - which should be of a modest length worn close to the knee.

**Boys' ties** - which should be tied at the conventional length reaching to the trouser waistband.

*Hairstyles* - no extremes of styling or colour. Shaved areas, lines or patterns are <u>not</u> permitted.

*Jewellery* - should be discrete and only unobtrusive stud earrings are allowed.

*Makeup* - should not be obvious. We do <u>not</u> permit nail extensions or coloured nail varnish below the Sixth Form.

We ask for your support in ensuring that your sons and daughters look smart; please do not put us in a difficult position by allowing them to return to school in September with incorrect uniform, unconventional hair styling or excessive jewellery.

In the meantime I hope you enjoy the rest of the summer and any family time you may have with your sons and daughters.





### **Celebrating 60 years**

In September 1956 the newly-built Langley Grammar School admitted its first group of students - 176 of them in all. There were 13 staff, led by the Headmaster Mr John Day.







60 years on, we have celebrated the anniversary of that opening year in a variety of ways including the 'Back to the 60s' Focus Day in November, and our whole school photograph in April. At the end of this term we held two more special events......



### **Celebrating 60 years**

On Wednesday 6 July we held a whole-school assembly which was attended by former staff and some members of that original 1956 group of pupils. We heard from former pupils about their memories of their time at the school, and also from former staff on how the school has changed over the years.



#### One of our former '1956' pupils wrote this afterwards...

"I thoroughly enjoyed the assembly, tour of the school, talking to staff and pupils also catching up with old class mates. I was very impressed by all I heard and saw, it was a pleasure to know that the same strong commitment, values and ethics are as important today as they were in 1956. You are all a credit to Langley Grammar.

I hope you go on to achieve all of your goals and maintain the high standards of LGS. My message to you all is always try your best, never have any regrets. Be proud of your badge and wear it with pride."

The second event on Saturday 15 July saw some 120 former students re-living their memories by looking round the school. There were some wonderful stories told and it was heartening to see the obvious affection the former students had for the school 30, 40, 50 or more years on. We heard about the changes to the buildings, the threatened closure of the school in the 1980s and the awe in which the second headmaster Dr Robinson was held.



Our visitors were able to walk round the school and see for themselves how the site has developed into the impressive facilities we have today.
