Dear Parents

Well, the staff and student - and you as parents - have all finally made it to the end of the academic year. And it has been quite a year....! During the last week of term we held assemblies with each year group to reflect on the year and to celebrate the students' successes. The contrast between the start of the year and the end is huge; back in September we were still dealing with high Covid absence rates, some control measures still in place, and tentatively taking steps to restart our wider programme of trips and other activities. By the end of the summer term we were back to (almost) normal, with lots of visits, residentials, Duke of Edinburgh's Award expeditions, Sports Day, concerts, variety and art shows, and our lower school musical 'Greased Lightning'.

It has been great to see the enthusiasm of students as they have involved themselves in all these activities once again alongside their academic studies. Our final assembly on Friday of last week provided an opportunity for students to thank the staff for their hard work and dedication to putting on such a range of events and opportunities alongside their teaching commitments; our Head girl and Head Boy, Dorina and Ishir, gave a well-received vote of thanks. 

Flatford Mill July 2022

The year 12 Biology students ended a challenging year of AS Biology with a 3 day residential field trip to Flatford Mill at the beginning of July. Nilani Sivakaran, Abha Desai, Sneha Sheshappanavar and Ishir Sharma were amongst them, and kindly agreed to share the experience.

After an early start on Monday, getting into school by 6.15, we embarked on our journey to Flatford Mill. Once we arrived there, following a quick break, we got straight into activities, with some classroom learning and then heading to Grove Woods, to do some quadrat sampling and biological drawings, identify various plant species and measure abiotic factors, as well as a brief encounter with some sheep, which we all enjoyed, despite the odd injury from plants around us. Following a visit to our accommodation, more classroom work, we had dinner and did a mark-release-recapture experiment, which would be revisited the next morning. The end of the day involved 2 hours to ourselves, which many of us used to explore the vast areas of beautiful fields and forest around us - a nice end to a rather busy day.

We woke up on Tuesday to the lovely sound of birds, a bit too early some may add, but excited for the day ahead. We started off checking the pitfall traps that we had set up the night before. To our amazement, one of the groups managed to catch a small grasshopper and our knowledgeable guide Simon explained about the different methods of ventilation on the grasshopper's legs and the haemolymph within the body. Having learnt about insect ventilation in class, this was really interesting to see up close with the grasshopper in a small container.

The highlight for many on this day was visiting Holbrook salt marsh to see a real life example of succession taking place. We laid out 75m long transects from the shore and used a pin quadrat to measure & record the abundances of different plant species at regular distances from the shore. While it was initially difficult to tell the exact species of each plant, our plant identification guides provided us with images to help match the plant to its species by its general appearance. Most students found glasswort to be the most interesting plant of all as it was in fact edible (and extremely salty!). Alongside this, we also measured abiotic (non-living) factors, such as wind speed, soil temperature and soil compaction. Each measurement required its own equipment, each with oddly amusing names, which was surprising since we hadn't known such tools existed before! Familiarising ourselves with these instruments was a task in itself but left us feeling like true scientists. Whilst all students were excited to get 'stuck in' to our practical tasks, some had ended this on a messier note than others, with mud and clay consuming a majority of their wellington boots! After returning to our classrooms, we were able to plot our recorded data into digital kite diagrams to help us deduce conclusions for our results. We could finally see the correlations of each of our recorded variables with distance from the shore and we could this to our hypotheses to conclude our experiment.

Our evening activity involved the beginning of our mark-release-recapture experiment to estimate the population of woodlice. We set out with our boxes and spoons, ready to collect as many woodlice as possible - we only had 10 minutes, and the group with the most woodlice caught would earn the all-desired bragging rights! After this time, we marked each woodlouse with a small spot of white paint, whilst counting them in anticipation. The winning group had caught a whopping 66 woodlice! - a phenomenal effort. We recorded the total number of woodlice initially caught and released our white-spotted woodlice back into their habitat to continue with their daily life until we recapture them the next day. As disgusted most of us initially were of these tiny creatures, we eventually began to realise they weren't so repulsive after all and actually rather tolerable.



This thought concluded our practical endeavours for the day, as our appreciation for the natural environment at Flatford Mills continued to grow.

The last day... we all woke up with a sad smile, had a walk around this beautiful Grade 1 Listed Area for the last time, scarfed down a lovely breakfast and prepared ourselves for the final activities of the trip. We jumped into our Wellington boots and waded into the many lakes in the area for some freshwater sampling; we found a variety of invertebrates from newts and larvae to small fish and dragonflies! After identifying the species (meticulously) and measuring some more abiotic factors we trudged back to our classes leaving a trail of muddy LGS footprints in our wake...

All in all, this trip was not only biologically and ecologically enriching but also helped us appreciate the beauty of nature as well as the sheer importance these areas have in protecting our planet. Most importantly, we had quadrats (□) of fun and made many wonderful memories; whether that be being horribly stuck in Salt Marshes or exploring the gorgeous woodland!

We'd like to give a big thank you to all of our wonderful teachers who helped make this trip so special: Ms D'Autherau (we hope we gave you a wonderful last trip here at LGS!), Ms Du Preez, Dr Coggins, Mr Haideree, Mr Pacha and the many great tutors from the Field Studies Council. Finally, a special thank you to Ms Dhillon for all your hard work in making this trip possible; we were all so lucky to go on this

A message from the Chair of Governors - July 2022

Busy Biologists....!

It's been a very exciting term in the Biology department, with a range of debates and guest speakers organised by the Biology Society, more podcasts added to our library in Spotify (search for 'LGS Bio Guys'), our first residential field trip for year 12 in 3 years (see our trip report) and more competitions. If you don't already, please do follow us on Twitter @BiologyLgs

Year 9 and 10 students were given the opportunity to take part in the Biology Challenge, run by the UKBC and the Royal Society for Biology. Over 41,000 students took part in an online competition to test students knowledge of biology beyond the requirements of the specification. 65 students took part, out of which more than half of them got Bronze award or higher, putting them in the top 30% of everyone who was involved. A special well done to Catherine Xiao, who got Gold – only achieved by the top 5% of participants!

Soon after this, our year 12 Biologists took part in the Intermediate Biology Olympiad to become our most successful cohort in this competition yet. Nearly 13,000 students took part

- half of our cohort achieved a Bronze award or higher, and the Gold award, given to only the top 5%, was achieved by 8 of them!


