Dear Parents

So now we know what is happening......

The Government has announced that schools will reopen to all pupils and students from 8th March, with some flexibility for secondary schools to phase the return of students during that week.

In this edition of Headlines you will find the main details you need to know about the phased return. This will be following by some more detailed documentation next week, similar to that used at previous stages.

We are obviously pleased and relieved that there is clarity about how students are going to be returning, and what the expectations are in terms of the system of infection controls. It is important the students realise that they are coming back broadly into the same situation they were in during the autumn term, with similar control measures. It is <u>not</u> 'back to normal' just yet.

Infections rates are still high nationally, and locally in Slough and West London boroughs they remain higher than average. It is essential that *everyone* continues to follow the restrictions that are in place; one of the reasons these restrictions remain is so that schools <u>can</u> be reopened. The Government is prioritising education ahead of opening up other sectors of society.

I am sure we are all encouraged by the rollout of the vaccination programme and the media coverage of the levels of protection against serious illness which are being seen. We would strongly everyone to take up the offer of vaccination; however, it is important to remember that no vaccine is 100% effective for any illness and that precautions such as social distancing will still be needed for the time being, as we are being advised.

I will write next week with further details about the return to school. In the meantime I hope that we can all start to view the next few months with optimism as we see the situation improving nationally and we begin those first steps back towards 'normality' - beginning with reopening our classrooms for your sons and daughters.

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School reopening

What has the Government announced?

On Monday of this week, the Government announced that primary and secondary school pupils would return to school for face to face teaching from Monday 8th March.

In secondary schools, students will be offered three Covid tests, using lateral flow testing devices, three to five days apart over the first two weeks back. The tests are intended to detect cases of coronavirus where a student may be carrying enough virus to be infectious, but is not displaying any symptoms. Any such cases can be quickly identified and students asked to self-isolate rather than remain in school. Taking the tests is not compulsory, but is strongly encouraged. After the first three tests in school, students will be offered lateral flow tests to take at home.

So when will students actually return to school?

Some phasing of the return to school is allowed over that first week, to allow schools to put the testing process in place. We have decided to bring students back in to school on the following days:

Day	Year groups returning to school in school	Year groups learning at home
Monday 8th March	Year 11 and Year 13	Years 7-10 and Year 12
Tuesday 9th March	Year 10 and Year 12	Years 7, 8 and 9
Wednesday 10th March	Year 8 and Year 9	Year 7
Thursday 11th March	Year 7	
Friday 12th March	All year groups now back	

When students return to school, they will go immediately to registration and then normal lessons. They will then be withdrawn from lessons during the day to take the lateral flow tests if they have chosen to do so. The second and third tests will take place a few days later for each year group; for example, Year 11 will probably be offered their second test on Thursday 11th March, two further year groups have their second test on Friday 12th March, and so on through the following week.

What will school be like?

Students will be returning to a very similar situation to the autumn term. The Government guidance requires us to implement a system of controls similar to that in the last term; this includes keeping year groups separated as far as possible, using base rooms for as many lessons as possible, and staggering the break and lunch times. There will also be the same separated social zones and catering arrangements.

There are some changes to the guidance which are important. For example, there is an increased emphasis on good hand hygiene, washing hands or using sanitiser when arriving on site, when returning from breaks, before eating, and when changing rooms. As in the Autumn term, we will ensure that the appropriate control measures are all in place and staff will be asked to ensure that students follow the procedures.



School reopening

What about face coverings?

In the autumn term, we asked students to wear face coverings on site, removing them in classrooms for lessons or when eating.

From 8th March, the Government is recommending that face coverings are worn indoors in all situations where social distancing cannot be guaranteed. This includes in classrooms for lessons. We have therefore decided that:

- ⇒ Students must wear face coverings when they are inside any school building, including in lessons.
- ⇒ Where the wearing of face coverings is impractical or inappropriate, for example, in PE or some practical subjects, students will be able to remove them.
- ⇒ Students will be able to remove face coverings when outdoors. The scientific evidence is that the risk of virus transmission is significantly reduced outside.

As in the Autumn term, we ask that students bring **reusable face coverings** and not paper ones as they may be putting them on and taking them off several times each day. They should have more than one so that a clean covering can be used each day.

What happens to students while they are waiting to come back in?

As we bring students back into school, they will resume face-to-face teaching in classrooms as set out in the timetable. For those students who are still at home on Monday 8th, Tuesday 9th or Wednesday 10th March, remote learning will be provided as it is now. Teachers will run online lessons in the same way they are currently doing, and students will be expected to attend. The timetable structure will continue for home learning, but the lesson timings will change to align them with the timings for face-to-face lessons back in school.

Students will be given full details of the timings of the school day from 8th March next week.

What happens if you find Covid cases in school?

As in the Autumn term, it is possible that we may have cases of Covid confirmed in school. This may be because a student develops symptoms, goes for a test and then gets a positive result, or asymptomatic testing reveals positive cases who are not displaying symptoms.

Where positive cases are identified, the students will be asked to self isolate immediately in line with public health guidance. Close contacts will be identified from seating plans will also be asked to self isolate. Remote learning will be provided for those asked to self isolate, as happened in the autumn term.

Do students have to come back to school?

Yes. During the lockdown, the legal requirement for children to attend school was suspended. This is being reversed and from Monday 8th March, **the legal requirement is for children to be back in school**. The school has no authority to authorise any absence apart from specifically define reasons such as illness, or a requirement to remain at home because of association with a positive Covid case. Parents may have understandable concerns about the return and we are happy to discuss these to provide reassurance.



Lateral flow testing

What is the purpose of the testing?

Testing is important because staff and students without symptoms could be carrying the virus and may spread it to others. Testing staff and students without symptoms will support schools to operate as safely as possible.

Simple and quick tests, known as Lateral Flow Device (LFD) tests, enable us to rapidly test students and staff, without the need for a laboratory. The tests return a result within 30 minutes. All secondary schools have been provided with test kits to conduct testing on site by setting up an Asymptomatic Test Site (AST).

How good are the tests?

The has been a lot of media coverage about the 'accuracy' of the lateral flow test devices. The Covid tests which many of you will have had by booking a slot at a local testing centre are known as PCR tests. They can detect extremely small traces of the virus, and can return a positive result even when there is little risk of someone actually passing the virus on.

The Lateral Flow Devices (LFDs) used in school will not detect very small viral loads. However, they can detect cases where someone is carrying the virus at a level which might mean they are infectious. Every positive Covid case detected by LFDs is a case that would not otherwise have been discovered until symptoms were obvious and the risk of transmission was higher.

So, it is important to remember:

- ⇒ A negative test result does <u>not</u> mean that someone is free of the virus. It simply means that at that particular time, the test did not detect any significant viral load.
- ⇒ A positive test result is highly likely to indicate that someone is carrying enough viral load to be infectious.

LFDs are widely used in many workforces, including the NHS, for screening programmes where workers are given supplies of tests to carry out at home.

What does the test involve?

The test involves swabbing tonsils at the back of the throat and one nostril and processing the swab with the Lateral Flow Device (LFD)

Students will go to our Asymptomatic Test Site (located in the new teaching block) where they will carry out the swabbing themselves under supervision - this takes just a minute or two. They then pass the swab to a member of the team for processing.

The team record the result and upload this to the NHS database. The students will have registered themselves on the database before taking the test - this can be done on an iPad or mobile phone. They will receive the result as an email and/or text message.



If any student's test returns a positive result, they will be spoken to by a member of staff and parents contacted before the result is uploaded to the NHS database. The student will need to go straight home to self isolate. We will also ask any close contacts to self-isolate.

National Careers Week


National Careers Week is a whole week of virtual events, from 1st to 6th March 2021.






More comments and examples from our staff this week.....




