- ⇒ On Thursday 19th January, all students in Years 8 to Year 13 will be attending a talk delivered by antiviolence campaigner Alison Cope, in which she shares the story of the tragic loss of her son Joshua to knife crime. Safeguarding update

You may be aware of the recent media coverage of **Andrew Tate**, a controversial British-American former kickboxer and internet personality/online influencer. Tate first came to prominence in 2016 when he was removed from TV show Big Brother over a video appearing to show him attacking a woman. His popularity soared after videos of him began circulating on TikTok. He was banned from Twitter in 2017 for saying women should "bear responsibility" for being sexually assaulted, and has also been banned from Facebook, YouTube, Instagram and TikTok for his misogynistic views. He is now back and active on Twitter following Elon Musk's takeover of the platform. Tate was recently arrested in Romania, where he is based, as part of a human trafficking and rape investigation. He is being detained along with his brother while awaiting trial.

Schools across the UK are encountering increasing numbers of younger boys who say they admire Tate, or at least appear to agree with some of his views. While they usually know that he says a lot of terrible things, many also see him as glamorous, good looking, successful and 'cool'. We will be using assemblies in the coming week to raise students awareness of 'toxic masculinity' in the media and to reaffirm that in this school everyone is valued and we do not view any one type of person as less than another.

We would encourage you to discuss with your children how social media algorithms work, and their tendency to recommend emotive and reactive content. Emphasise that just because a video is being pushed to your feed by automated systems on social media doesn't mean you have to agree with or even like what you're seeing.
