Dear Parents

Here we are at the end of a long, tiring, and recently very cold Autumn term.....!

Earlier this week I was looking back at our staff bulletin for the last week of term a year ago. I noted a Government announcement about 'Plan B Covid restrictions', a reminder to staff to undertake lateral flow testing at home before returning to school, and preliminary plans for students to have a staggered return to school over three days with lateral flow testing for everyone. In December 2021, Queen Elizabeth II was monarch, Boris Johnson Prime Minister, Nadhim Zahawi Secretary of State for Education. Petrol was about £1.45 a litre and inflation was running at about 5%....


It has certainly been an eventful twelve months since then. We have had two monarchs, three Prime Ministers and five Secretaries of State for Education. Petrol peaked at £2 a litre, inflation rose to 11%, and there have been eye-watering increases to energy prices which have impacted us all.

Despite all this, in school we have returned to something resembling normality, and it has been a pleasure to see so many school events and activities reinstated over the last twelve months. Sports Day, house events, educational visits, carol service, concerts and productions have all been back up and running to complement the routine academic timetable. This week saw the return of Junior House Music - a traditional feature of the end of the Autumn term not held since 2019. None of the year groups participating - Years 7, 8 and 9 - had experienced the event before, but they entered into it enthusiastically and is good to see the level of musical talent we know will be coming up through the school for future events.

Our Year 11s, 12s and 13s have been focused on the practice examinations and assessments taking place before and after the Christmas break. We hope they are encouraged that the performance of last year's Year 11 and 13 examination groups had been recognised by our including in the top 10 schools in the South East and the top 40 nationally in the Sunday Times 'Parent Power Guide'. It is clearly the students' own efforts that get them the outcomes, but we hope that our rise in this particular table indicates that there is something very effective about the way our staff guide, help and support them to do so.

May I wish you and your families an enjoyable and peaceful Christmas break and my very best wishes for the New Year ahead.

Sunday Times 'Parent Power' guide - December 2022

The Times/Sunday Times newspapers have published their annual 'Parent Power' guide and league tables based on the 2022 GCSE and A Level results.

The Parent Power guide is widely acknowledged as an authoritative survey of the country's highestachieving schools. It links to school websites and Ofsted inspection reports, while also drawing on exam results for its league tables.

The ranking in these annual tables has always been based on actual grades achieved, and the methodology in takes into account both GCSE and A Level outcomes, giving double the weighting to A Levels. It is possibly the only comparator tool that takes both levels of qualification into account.

Planning application Redevelopment of the old caretaker's house site.

When the new school buildings were being designed, the school agreed to put in approximately £600k of school funds to enhance aspects of the design beyond the basic specification being provided by the Department for Education. Slough Borough Council funded the expansion elements, to a total of around £3.5 million, and the DfE funded the main redevelopment, of approximately £13 million.

The school's contribution is to be funded through the sale and redevelopment of the old caretaker's house at the west corner of the school site. Permission to sell the land has been given by the Secretary of State for Education, and the school is working in partnership with a property development company to develop the site.

The plan is to build a small block of flats on this plot. The sale of these properties would enable the school to recoup the £600k investment in the buildings, and provide a further significant sum to enhance the sporting facilities for the benefit of the students **and** the local community.

Slough Borough Council refused planning permission for the first application earlier this year. The developers have worked closely with the planning authorities to prepare a second application which is now being considered.

We understand there may be some local anxiety about potential building works, but we would encourage local parents to lend their support to this application so that our students and other families who live near the school, can benefit from the development.

Admissions consultation 2024 entry to Year 7 and Year 12

The main principles of the admissions arrangements for Langley Grammar School have remained unchanged since the last formal consultation was carried out in 2019.

There are **no changes proposed to the admissions arrangements for 2024 entry** from those previously published for 2022 and 2023.

However, the wording of the admissions arrangements have been subject to some minor amendments in recent years. These are as a result of the introduction of the 2021 School Admissions Code, and where minor changes to some wording have been required for the purpose of clarification.

Under the School Admissions Code, there is no requirement for formal consultation for these arrangements this year. However, in view of the amendments made, the school is making the draft arrangements for 2024 entry available for inspection to interested parties in advance of their determination by the Governing Board in February 2023.

The Code states we should consult parents of children between the ages of two and eighteen. This is difficult to do in practice as it includes parents of children who are not currently at our school. Please would you therefore pass this information on to any parents in your networks who might have an interest in the admissions arrangements in 2024.

We welcome comments on the draft admissions arrangements for 2024 entry; any comments received will be considered by the Governing Board before the final determination of the arrangements in February 2023.

Sixth Form subject visits and activities

Economics A level

In November 2022 we provided A Level Economics students with the opportunity to learn more about an economist's role and the opportunities available as a graduate.

Vasudha and Tolly are economists at the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO), and they offered guidance and an insight about economics generally as a subject, about working for the government economic service and about working for the FCDO. This included different entry routes into this profession and remuneration packages offered.

As a routine part of our Sixth Form curriculum we provide opportunities for students to relate their studies to real-world situations. We do this by bringing visitors into school, or by taking students out to a range of external events and companies.

Here are just two examples from a range of similar activities which took place this term across a number of subjects....

Business Studies MediaLab visit

In November, Year 12 Business Studies students visited MediaLab, one of the UK's leading independent media agencies. A variety of activities and talks were presented to help students gain an insight into marketing and advertising, and the different job roles in the company, from TV advertising directors to account executives and the HR department. This was extremely helpful, as many of did not realise how many different types of careers are possible just in the marketing and advertising field alone.

Towards the end of the day, students had to complete a short task based on analysing budget and expenditure in order to provide a campaign for a mental health charity; they had to design and create a presentation identifying how best the charity can be advertised to allow more young people to open up regarding their mental health. This provided an opportunity to work in groups and demonstrate skills including teamwork, problem solving, creativity and communication.

"MediaLab allowed me to spark interest in the marketing sector and destroy previous perceptions of advertising and media. I learnt a lot about different types of advertising and the amount of thought that goes into the advert that reaches you."








Christmas Music

Traditionally held to mark the end of the Autumn Term, this was the first time in three years that the competition had been held due to the global pandemic, and therefore also the first time that the student organisers, presenters and performers had participated in it.

The Year 9 House Captains worked very hard throughout November and December to organise auditions and rehearsals, and were ably supported be the House Captains in Year 7 and 8. Each of the Houses produced a polished programme of four acts – a Solo, Ensemble. an an Original Composition, and a Whole House Song – featuring a wide range of styles and genres including the vocal stylings of Rihanna and Sia; Hans Zimmer- and Rock-and-Roll -inspired piano compositions; and mass performances sung with great gusto of hits by Jimmy Durante, Brenda Lee and of course the seasonally-ubiquitous Mariah Carey.

What a wonderfully-enjoyable way to round-off the Autumn Term!



THAN THIS OF JULIET AND HER ROMEO'

Romeo and Juliet by Langley Grammar School at South Hill Park Arts Centre, 08/11/22 appraised by Iain Jones

I want to take this opportunity to congratulate you, Langley Grammar School, for your marvellous interpretation of Romeo and Juliet as part of the Autumn 22 Shakespeare Schools Festival. It was a great night at the theatre, and I'd like to take this time here to mention a few things that I really loved!

This company brought their story brilliantly up-to-date, with a setting that Shakespeare would have loved - Hogwarts. This was not only reflected in the costumes but also in the language of the play - what a creative idea it was to change Capulets and Montagues into Gryffindors and Slytherins, and the word 'swords' into 'wands!' It made us feel that the company had full ownership over the story.

The ensemble worked together with full commitment, seamlessly moving from scene to scene and constantly populating the stage. There was beautiful choral speaking and a prince played by everyone – such a clever idea.

You were at ease with Shakespeare's language and used it confidently and effectively. You demonstrated a keen understanding of its meaning, and of what your characters were trying to achieve with it. The words sounded vibrant, muscular, and grounded.

The actors also became the set, creating architecture, and echoing the romance of Romeo and Juliet in the balcony scene. The party was highly energised with sharp choreography, and the back-and-forth of the fight, with glow-stick wands, was exhilarating to watch. Important Safety Notice





Be careful around water in winter. Frozen water

is dangerous and can have fatal consequences.

Our Advice:

- Never venture onto frozen water. Even if it appears thick from the bank, it can easily break and you do not know how deep the water is below or how thin the ice is.
- Do not be tempted to test the thickness of the ice. It is easy to slip from the bank and fall through into the freezing water.
- Time your walks to make the most of the daylight; if you need to walk in the evening only use well-lit areas or take a route that avoids water.
- Do not wander near the edge, icy or wet conditions could cause you to slip.

What to do if you fall through the ice:

- · Keep calm and shout for help.
- Spread your arms across the surface of the ice in front of you.
- If the ice is strong enough, kick your legs to slide onto the ice.
- Lie flat and pull yourself towards the bank.
- If the ice breaks, work your way to the bank-breaking the ice in front of you.
- If you cannot climb out, wait for help and keep as still as possible. Press your arms by your side and keep your legs together. Keep your head clear of the water.
- Once you are safe, go to the hospital.

If you see someone fall through ice:

Ice Safety

- Shout for assistance and phone 999.
- Do not walk or climb onto the ice to attempt a rescue.
- Shout to the casualty to 'keep still' and offer reassurance to keep them calm.
- Try to reach them from the bank using a rope, pole, tree branch, or anything else which can extend your reach, such as clothing tied together.
- When reaching from the bank, lie down to avoid being pulled onto the ice
- If you cannot reach them, slide something which floats across the ice for them to hold onto whilst help is on the way.
- If the casualty is too far away, do not attempt to rescue them. Wait for the emergency services and continue to reassure the casualty.
- Make sure an ambulance has been called.
- Lay the casualty flat, check for normal breathing.
- Prevent them from getting colder by covering them with warm clothing and blankets.
- Create some shelter and get them out of the cold if possible.
- Do not rub their skin and do not apply hot water bottles.
