



Dear Parents

Welcome to the start of the new school year! I would like to particularly welcome all parents who are joining the Langley Grammar School community this term. We are very pleased to welcome new students into Year 7, Year 12, and a small number to some other year groups.

Students will be returning to school over the next three school days, beginning with Year 7 and Year 12 on Friday 3rd September. Years 10, 11 and 13 return on Monday 6th September and Years 8 and 9 on Tuesday 7th September. Further details about the return arrangements can be found in this newsletter and on the school website.

As we start the new term with two staff training days, we are delighted to welcome new members of our teaching and support teams, and particularly two new senior colleagues who join the Senior Leadership Team. Full details are given on the next page.

There has been much media speculation about the potential impact of reopening schools in September, and some of you may be viewing the prospect with some anxiety. I think we are 'cautiously optimistic' about the start of this new school term. Cautious because Covid remains very much with us despite the lifting of the remaining restrictions by the Government earlier this summer, and we still need to work with systems of infection control. Further details of those measures are in this newsletter. Nevertheless, we are very optimistic about what lies ahead this year as we return to something approaching normal school operation, and see the completion of our building project with all the new facilities that provides for us. We are looking forward to reestablishing our normal programmes of activities, visits and extracurricular provision, although we do need to proceed carefully and ensure that we do no compromise health and safety considerations by doing so.

Unfortunately, the construction work on the school site is not *quite* finished yet, and we have around three more weeks until the external works are completed. In addition, there are some delays to the final fitting out of some parts of the new main building due to circumstances beyond our control. Despite this, I think we can regard bringing in an £18 million development project during an international pandemic with only a five week delay as something of a success! Once the builders have finished in late September, I look forward to being able to welcome you into the school to view the new facilities - we will be holding a series of open sessions when you can come and look round.

We look forward to seeing your sons and daughters again, and wish you and your families well for the school year ahead.

Autumn term return to school

The revised guidance for the new school year from the Department for Education requires us to offer on-site asymptomatic Covid-19 testing as students return to school. This requires us to operate a staggered start to the term. The confirmed plans are as follows.

Timings of the school day

In September we are expecting the timings of the school day to return to normal, with just some minor changes to the lesson timings during the day to facilitate movement around the school. The new timings are shown below.

Infection controls

The Department for Education has issued guidance for schools for implementation in the Autumn term.

There are four key aspects to the 'system of controls' required by Public Health. These are:

- Ensure good hygiene for everyone hand washing or sanitization, and good respiratory hygiene.
- Maintain appropriate cleaning regimes to include more frequent regular cleaning of 'touch points' such as door handles.
- ☑ Keep occupied spaces **well ventilated** by opening classroom windows and doors and maintaining good air circulation.
- Follow public health advice on testing, selfisolation and managing confirmed cases of COVID-19 within the school community.

How will school be operating?

In line with Government guidance we are returning to something resembling 'normal' school operation this term., but with the system of controls outline on the previous page in place.

Students will be expected to.....

- \Rightarrow Wash and sanitise their hands regularly.
- \Rightarrow Follow good respiratory hygiene practice for coughs and sneezes "catch it, kill it, bin it".
- \Rightarrow Take two lateral flow Covid tests in school at the start of term to check for asymptomatic Covid cases.
- \Rightarrow Ensure they do not come into school if unwell, and particularly if exhibiting Covid symptoms.
- \Rightarrow Carry out regular Covid testing at home using the lateral flow test kits distributed by the school.

We will also be implementing other aspects of the system of controls, including additional regular cleaning, and ensuring that classrooms and other spaces are well-ventilated.

Depending on their year group, students may be asked to bring PE kit with them to school to change into, or may be asked to come to school already in their PE kit. This will be to reduce pressure on the changing rooms - students will be told what the arrangements are before their first PE/games lesson.

Are there any bubbles or separate social areas?

Students will be able to move freely around the school site during break and lunch and will not be confined to specific separate social areas.

We are reverting to the normal pattern of having subject staff based in specific rooms and students moving round the school - we have included some movement time in the school timings to help with this.

What about face coverings?

Face coverings are no longer recommended in Government guidance for schools. However, we know that students and staff may wish to continue wearing them in school as a courtesy to others and for their own reassurance. This is a matter of personal choice.

Students **are** advised to wear face coverings if they travel on public transport, school buses and shared taxis, or with people they do not normally mix with.

What happens if there is a positive Covid case in school?

If a student starts to demonstrate Covid symptoms while in school, we will immediately isolate them and contact their parents to come and take them home. They will be advised to get a PCR Covid test as quickly as possible.

If a student tests positive for Covid, through a PCR test, any contact tracing will be handled by NHS Test and Trace, possibly asking the school for help in confirming close contacts. Any other students identified as close contacts will not have to self isolate but will be asked to book a PCR test as soon as possible.

If there are a number of positive cases in school, we will seek advice from the public health authorities. In the case of an extensive outbreak, the public health authorities might impose some temporary local measures such as the reintroduction of face coverings.



New building and site update

As you will know, we took possession of the new main building at the very end of the summer term and the new facilities will provide a fantastic environment for students.

As is inevitable under the current situation with the combined effects of the pandemic and Brexit, there have been delays to the snagging, defect resolution and delivery of furniture for the new block. As a result some areas are not quite ready for use yet. Some specific implications are...

- ⇒ We have reduced seating capacity in the Dining Room for the first two weeks of term until a delayed furniture delivery arrives.
- \Rightarrow We are not yet able to accommodate two year groups into the hall for assemblies.
- \Rightarrow The Library will not be in use until the week commencing 14th September.

We expect these issues to be resolved quickly.

Externally, the remaining netball and tennis courts are under construction and various other elements of groundworks are being completed over the next three weeks.

We are still expecting all construction works to be completed by Tuesday 21st September.

There will be opportunities for parents to see the new buildings for themselves during the autumn term; these will be arranged after all construction work is complete.

Over the coming term we will be discussing with staff and students how to make the best use of our new facilities. This will include considering what additional outdoor seating and shelter we need to provide.

If you are visiting the school for any reason, please note that we will not have any visitor parking until the external works are complete later in September. Please park considerately in the local area. You can access the school through the main Reddington Drive gates, and Reception is on your right as you enter the main building.

- ⇒ We have noted the wish of many of you for a return to the **wide provision of additional activities** which we ran before the pandemic. This is very much part of the school's ethos and we are planning for a return to a full programme of clubs, activities and educational visits during his year.
- ⇒ A number of you are concerned about **mental health and wellbeing** this is definitely an area we will be addressing this year as we work to support students across all age groups.
- ⇒ We know that many parents would like more regular and detailed **information** about their child's progress. While we understand this, it is simply not possible for teachers to provide the level of feedback that some parents would wish for.
- ⇒ Opinions were divided about online Parent Teacher Consultations. Some of you really like them, particularly for the convenience of not having to travel into school. Others of you do not like the format. Unfortunately it is going to be difficult to find a format that pleases everyone.
- ⇒ Some of you would like more information about the **topics** your children are studying. We will be seeking to increase the amount of information provided to you, but parents do need to be aware that subject areas will adapt their planning during the year in response to the needs of the students.

We will say more about some of these issues at the series of parents' information briefings which will be held during the first part of this term.

Consultation on Relationships and Sex Education

Thank you to those parents who responded at the start of the summer holidayto our consultation on the school's Relationships and Sex Education Policy.

The Listening Project

Towards the end of the summer term we launched our 'Listening Project'. This is one part of our response to the concerns about sexual harassment and casual sexism raised by current and former students in schools across the country, including ours.

Students were able to book conversations with teachers who had been specifically trained in the aims of the project. A number came forward and the conversations were very informative. At this stage of the project, most - but certainly not all - of the students who were involved were girls, and some of the things they told us aligned with the experiences of girls across the country.

As parents, you can help us - and all our students - address some of the issues of sexism and misogny in two specific ways. The key thing is to open up conversations with your child. If your child is female, encourage her to tell us about her experiences and particularly about any unacceptable behaviour she encounters from others. If your child is male, talk to him about the equality of women and how to ensure that they are treated with respect.

We will be continuing the project this term to give students the opportunity to tell us about the issues that are important to them and how we can help them deal with them. We will be widening the scope of the conversations to look at other issues including the experience of prejudice based on race, religion or sexuality.

Why are we doing this?

We believe that these issues are very important to our students and they need to be listened to. By encouraging open and transparent discussion, we are seeking to understand the range of issue they are dealing with, so that we can help and support them more effectively.

In relation to the issues we have been exploring, we have included again on the next page the letter from the community of Slough secondary schools in response to the Ofsted report on sexual harassment in schools.



Slough schools' response to sexual harassment and abuse

Dear Parents

You may be aware that the national schools' inspectorate, Ofsted, recently published its findings from a rapid review of sexual abuse in schools.

All Slough schools have long had robust processes in place to respond with urgency and sensitivity when issues of this nature arise. The Ofsted report suggests that much of this abuse takes place in unsupervised areas outside school, such as parks or parties without adult supervision, but there are also incidents in schools which go unreported. However, what is particularly shocking to note from the report is the sheer prevalence of sexual harassment and online sexual abuse which Ofsted found.

Slough secondary schools have always worked in collaboration to serve the best interests of the young people of Slough. We are clear that any form of harassment or abuse is unacceptable and we are committed to working with primary school colleagues, families, the Local Authority and a full range of agencies to play our part in the community response to this problem which is required if we are to ensure our young people are safe.

As guided by Ofsted, we accept that our starting point should be to assume that sexual harassment is taking place in our schools, even if we have no evidence to support that and, on that basis, all Slough secondary schools are committed to a range of action including:

- * creating an environment where staff model respectful and appropriate behaviour
- * ensuring children and young people are clear about what is acceptable and unacceptable behaviour
- * creating an environment that allows children and young people to be confident to ask for help and support when they need it
- * carefully planning and implementing our Relationships, Sex & Health Education (RSHE) curriculum and pastoral programme
- * having in place sanctions and interventions to tackle poor behaviour
- * providing support for children and young people who need it
- * providing training and clear expectations for staff and governors
- * pro-actively seeking and listening to the views and experiences of children and young people
- * sharing good practice within and across schools and partners

As the harassment or abuse very often happens outside school in the community or online, we would encourage all families to use the publication of this report to raise the topic with their children in an open and supportive manner. There are important lessons and learning here for every child, irrespective of gender. We are committed to working together to encourage children to feel able to disclose anything that makes them uncomfortable, to empower them to make the right choices, and to make our schools and communities as safe as they can be.
