



- Research choice of course & university
- Application through UCAS, by a school deadline
- Reference written by the school
- Consideration by university admissions tutors



Applying to University

How can you support?

- Subjects performance and enjoyment
- Match subjects to courses
- Some vocations require specific subjects and grades
- Higher Ideas, eClips

How do they start?

- Talk to students who have been through the process or are studying at chosen university
- Emotionally support by understanding the process
- Top universities are looking for well rounded, independent learners who **show** a real passion for the subject





- Finance: fees; living costs; bursaries



Seven sections to be completed by student:


- Personal details

- Student finance
- Choices
- Education



- Part-time Employment
- Personal statement

Reference from school

School enters <u>predicted grades</u> for pending qualifications (Alevels)



Choices

- Maximum of five choices
- Realism: make sure track record & predicted grades match academic requirements
- Include one "back-up" choice with lower requirements
- Some choice restrictions:
 Medicine; Dentistry;
 Veterinary Science: max. 4
 choices
 Oxford or Cambridge
- Simultaneous consideration
- "Invisibility"



Personal Statement

- Applicant's opportunity to show why he or she is a good candidate for the course
- •Focus should be 75% academic
- Proof read for spelling, grammar and sense
- •Lots of guidance in school, one to one guidance by form tutor and by a relevant subject teacher.
- Must be student's own work: <u>beware plagiarism</u>
- Beware asking those who are out of date.

Personal Statement

- The only section your son or daughter has control over.
- Their only chance to market themselves individually. They need to demonstrate their interest in the course.
- One personal statement for all choices.



Max. 4,000 characters, 47 lines


Min. 1,000 characters

No spelling/grammar check

No formatting

Personal Statement- School support

- Personalised 1:1 support with their tutor
- Sixth Form Leadership Team
- Careers Adviser
- Academic Mentor
- Specialist subject staff
- Specialist workshops for those on the Oxbridge Pathway
- Specialist workshops for those applying for Medicine and Dentistry.




School Reference

- Written by form tutor with input from all subject teachers
- Reviewed by a team of approvers
- Positive and honest
- •Predicted grades- based on evidence. These will be published late Sept. and will be on emailed home.
- •Review with student to check for errors or omissions (good practice).
- Recommendation on their suitability

This takes three weeks

Application Timeline



Consideration by universities

- Interviews for some courses
- Additional tests for some courses / universities
- Monitor through TRACK Conditional offer (or unsuccessful)
- Applicant replies to offers after receipt of all responses:
 - One firm acceptance
 - One insurance acceptance
 - Decline other offers
- UCAS Extra available if no offers received
- Results Day
- Adjustment and Clearing

Decisions and Replies

Provider decisions:

- Unsuccessful
- Unconditional offer- BEWARE
- Conditional offer qualifications and achievements and/or UCAS Tariff points

Once all decisions are received, they can hold up to two offers:

- One as their firm choice
- One as their insurance choice (if they want to)
- All other offers are declined

Track will show their reply date.

Other options



Extra 24 Feb – 4 July

 If all five choices have been used and they have no offers/rejected all offers.

Clearing from early-July

• If there are no offers, or have applied after 30 June deadline.

Adjustment

- (from A level results day)
- If they've gained better results than the conditional offer they hold, they could apply for
- a different course or university.

What should your son/daughter be doing now?



- Research
- Reflect on supercurricular activities
- Work experience (if relevant)
- Going beyond the specification
- Focus on this year's studies and internal exams.
